

Devotional: Day 7: The Psalmist

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I hear a sound: A trumpet being blow, along with other brass instruments, proclaiming the sound from heaven.

I hear a sound: a clinking sound as chains are being broken, as the captives are being set free.

I hear a sound: the deaf praising God and the blind worshipping Him, as eyes begin to see and eyes begin to hear the truth, the real Truth: Jesus.

I hear the music: The music of God and the heavenly hosts rejoicing.

I hear the songs: The music of heaven being heard across the land, as the worshipers proclaim the now Word.

And I see healing to come to our land, as the prophetic voice is heard once again.

Are you ready for that?

Are we ready for the prophetic to move in our corporate time of worship?

Are you ready for the prophetic wave of God to move among us?

Are you ready to move in the prophetic, being the voice of God wherever you are?

Are you ready to be the person who will be the voice of God, when key decisions have to be made?

In the midst of the storm, are you ready to be the one who voices the Rhema Word of God which calms the ragging sea?

Are you ready to be the one, who will speak what is on the Father's heart?

Are you ready?

Are you listening?

Are you prepared?

Psalm 45:1 1 NKJV, "My heart is overflowing with a good theme; I recite my composition concerning the King; My tongue is the pen of a ready writer."

Are you ready to move into the prophetic?

Are you, like the psalmist, ready to play or sing and write the music of heaven, like the ready writer?

Another translation for the above verse uses the word "skilled" for the word "ready". So in other words, how much training have you invested into your gifts. Are you skilled enough to write the songs God gives to you? The key thing I guess you can ask yourselves is: "*Am I prepared for what God wants me to do?*"

When everyone was afraid when the Philistines came up against the Israelites, where did David get the boldness to step up to Goliath? He received it in his quiet times, when he was looking after the sheep, when no one was looking. His preparation started when he fought the bear. His training began when he fought the lion. David fought Goliath with the weapons he was familiar with. The tools he had trained with. He didn't use Saul's sword, because he wasn't familiar with it.

How can we expect God to move through us if we are not spending time with Him, and not familiar with spending time with Him?

Application:

If we are not encountering Him in our private times, then how can we expect God to use us in our corporate time of worship?

As Steve & Vel have taught us over the years, in our quiet times let's open up a psalm and start using the words to sing a new song to the Lord. And watch the difference this will make in our worship!
